



H.E. GIORGI MARGVELASHVILI

PRESIDENT OF GEORGIA

H.E. Giorgi Margvelashvili was elected President of Georgia on October 27th, 2013. A former Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Education and Science in the government of Prime Minister Bidzina Ivanishvili, President Margvelashvili is a committed democrat and reformer who revitalized the country's education system after years of neglect. While he is not affiliated with any political party, he was nominated to be the presidential candidate of the governing Georgian Dream Coalition in May 2013, and was elected with more than 62% of the vote. Before joining the Georgian Dream government after its victory in the October 2012 parliamentary elections, he was a well-known political commentator and served for more than a decade in senior positions at the Georgian Institute of Public Affairs (GIPA), a leading Georgian institution of higher education in government, law, international affairs and journalism. From 1996 to 1997, he taught philosophy and culture at Tbilisi Independent University. From 1995-2000, he was a local government expert in the Tbilisi office of the National Democratic Institute (NDI), the U.S.-based organization focused on strengthening democratic institutions worldwide. President Margvelashvili became briefly involved in Georgian politics prior to the November 2003 parliamentary elections, when he joined the opposition bloc led by former Prime Minister Zurab Zhvania. Following the Coalition's victory in these elections, President Margvelashvili was appointed Minister of Education and Science by Prime Minister Ivanishvili. In February 2013, he was appointed First Deputy Prime Minister and, in this capacity, worked closely with the Prime Minister, while continuing to fulfill his duties as Minister of Education and Science, until resigning from these positions in order to run for the October 2013 presidential elections. President Margvelashvili graduated from Tbilisi State University in 1992 with a degree in philosophy. He continued his studies at the Central European University in Prague, Czech Republic from 1993 to 1994 and the Institute of Philosophy of the Georgian Academy of Sciences from 1993 to 1996. In 1998, he received a Ph.D. in Philosophy from Tbilisi State University. President Margvelashvili is 44 years old and married, with a daughter, Ana, and newborn son, Teimuraz.



H.E. GIORGI KVIRIKASHVILI

PRIME MINISTER OF GEORGIA

H.E. Giorgi Kvirikashvili is the Prime Minister of Georgia. Prior to becoming Prime Minister in December 2015, he served as Vice Prime Minister (2013-2015) while serving as Foreign Minister (2015) and Minister of Economy and Sustainable Development (2012-2015). Kvirikashvili is leading the effort to modernize Georgia's economy and advance the country on its way to European and Euro-Atlantic economic and security structures. In order to foster greater development and encourage broad-based economic growth, Kvirikashvili is enacting a four-point reform plan focused on enhancing the business environment, reforming the educational system, developing regional infrastructure, and promoting good governance. In his previous ministerial roles, Kvirikashvili spearheaded major initiatives to advance Georgia's Euro-Atlantic and European integration, position Georgia as vital corridor connecting East and West on the new Silk Road, and make the country a more attractive destination for foreign direct investment. During his 12-year career in the financial sector, Kvirikashvili served at various position, including commercial bank leadership at the Chief Executive Officer level at one of Georgia's top 5 group member banks. He served as a Member of Parliament from 1999 to 2004 and as a team leader of the Parliament's working group on Georgia's accession to the WTO. He also completed several international consulting projects, advising on pension system reforms, financial sector reforms and bond market development. Kvirikashvili received a Master's degree in Finance from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign in the United States. He obtained an undergraduate degree in Economics from Tbilisi State University and an undergraduate degree in Medicine from Tbilisi State Medical Institute. He is married with four children and speaks Georgian, English, and Russian.



Ms. TINATIN KHIDASHELI

MINISTER OF DEFENSE OF GEORGIA

Ms. Tinatin Khidasheli has served as Minister of Defense of Georgia since May of 2015. In 1992 Ms. Khidasheli graduated with a B.A. degree in Journalism from Tbilisi State University. Ms. Khidasheli also holds a M.A. degree in International Law from Tbilisi State University (1995), as well as a M.A. in Political Science from Central European University in Budapest, Hungary (1996). Ms. Khidasheli completed a one-year non-degree program in Human Rights Advocates at Washington College of Law in Washington, D.C. in 1999. Post-graduation, in a period between 1992 and 1993, she worked at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Georgia (on probation). Within the same period, she moved to the Parliament of Georgia to hold a position of a leading specialist for inter-parliamentary relations. Between 1995 and 1997, she served as a director of the First Free Legal Aid Centre in Georgia. Between 1997 and 2000, she held a teaching position at Hawaii University (Tbilisi campus). Between 2000 and 2004, she served as a member of the National Anti-Corruption Council in Georgia. In 2004 she became the Yale World Fellow for Yale University, USA. Between 2004 and 2005, Ms. Khidasheli served as a chairperson of the governing board of the Open Society Georgia Foundation. In 2006 she was an independent consultant on the rule of law, anti-corruption and good governance. Between 2005 and 2009, she served as Secretary of International Affairs at the Republican Party of Georgia and was elected as a member of the Party National Committee. In 2009 she took up the position of Secretary of Capital Affairs. In 2009 she became a consultant and co-authored the "August Ruins" report on human rights and humanitarian law violations that took place during the Georgian-Russian War in August 2008. Between 2010 and 2012, Ms. Khidasheli was elected and served as a member of the Tbilisi City Council, and between 2012 and 2015, she served as a member of the Parliament of Georgia representing the Sagarejo district, as well as chairing the committee on European Integration in the Parliament of Georgia.



THE HONORABLE DONALD H. RUMSFELD

PRESIDENT, RUMSFELD FOUNDATION

The Honorable Donald H. Rumsfeld currently chairs the nonprofit Rumsfeld Foundation with, Joyce, his wife of more than 60 years. The Foundation was established in 2007 to support leadership and public service at home and the growth of freer political and economic systems abroad. Rumsfeld published his number one New York Times best-selling memoir, Known and Unknown, in 2011. The book spans his career and is complemented by extensive primary source documentation that can be found on his website, Rumsfeld.com. His second book, Rumsfeld's Rules, was published in May 2013, and was also featured on the New York Times Best Seller list. Recently, Rumsfeld ventured into the tech world, with the launch of his Churchill Solitaire "app." All of Rumsfeld's profits from his memoir, Known and Unknown, and from his Churchill Solitaire app are donated to the military charities supported by the Rumsfeld Foundation. Mr. Rumsfeld completed his second tour as Secretary of Defense in December 2006. During his tenure, he led the U.S. Department of Defense after the attack on 9/11 and in overseeing the reform and transformation of America's military to meet the new challenges of the 21st Century. A graduate of Princeton University and former naval aviator, Rumsfeld previously served as a Congressman, U.S. Ambassador to NATO, White House Chief of Staff under President Ford, Presidential Envoy to the Middle East for President Reagan, and CEO of two Fortune 500 companies and Chairman of a third. Rumsfeld and his wife have three children, seven grandchildren, and two great-grandchildren. They reside in New Mexico, and spend time in Montana, Maryland and Washington, D.C.



AMBASSADOR R. JAMES WOOLSEY

CHAIRMAN, FOUNDATION FOR DEFENSE OF DEMOCRACIES

Ambassador R. James Woolsey is a Venture Partner with Lux Capital Management and Chairs the Board of the Foundation for Defense of Democracies. Mr. Woolsey also currently chairs the Strategic Advisory Group of the Washington, D.C. private equity fund, Paladin Capital Group, chairs the Advisory Board of the Opportunities Development Group, and he is Of Counsel to the Washington, D.C. office of the Boston-based law firm, Goodwin Procter. He specializes in a range of alternative energy and security issues. Mr. Woolsey previously served in the U.S. Government on five different occasions, most recently (1993-95) as Director of Central Intelligence. From July 2002 to March 2008, Mr. Woolsey was a Vice President and officer of Booz Allen Hamilton, and then a Venture Partner with VantagePoint Venture Partners of San Bruno, CA until January 2011. During his 12 years of government service, in addition to heading the CIA and the Intelligence Community, Mr. Woolsey was: Ambassador to the Negotiation on Conventional Armed Forces in Europe (CFE), Vienna, 1989-1991; Under Secretary of the Navy, 1977-1979; and General Counsel to the U.S. Senate Committee on Armed Services, 1970-1973. He was also appointed by the President to serve on a part-time basis in Geneva, Switzerland, 1983–1986, as Delegate at Large to the U.S.-Soviet Strategic Arms Reduction Talks (START) and Nuclear and Space Arms Talks (NST). As an officer in the U.S. Army, he was an adviser on the U.S. Delegation to the Strategic Arms Limitation Talks (SALT I), Helsinki and Vienna, 1969-1970. Mr. Woolsey serves on a range of government, corporate, and non-profit advisory boards and chairs several. He has also been a member of The National Commission on Terrorism, 1999–2000; The Commission to Assess the Ballistic Missile Threat to the U.S. (Rumsfeld Commission), 1998; The President's Blue Ribbon Commission on Defense Management (Packard Commission), 1985–1986; and The President's Commission on Strategic Forces (Scowcroft Commission), 1983. Mr. Woolsey received his B.A. degree from Stanford University (1963), an M.A. from Oxford University (Rhodes Scholar 1963–1965) and an LL.B from Yale Law School (1968).



MR. HIKMAT ABDURAHMANOV

CHAIRMAN, ASSOCIATION FOR INTERNATIONAL BUSINESS & TECHNOLOGIES OF UZBEKISTAN

Mr. Hikmat Abdurahmanov is the Chairman of the Association for International Business & Technologies of Uzbekistan and is Head of a commercial group of companies with a core staff of 70 people involved in international business including business tourism, trade, finance and advisory services for SMEs. Since 2006, the company has brought over \$100 million worth of mini-technologies to SMEs. With their assistance, over 3,000 Uzbek business executives and government officials have visited foreign trade shows, factories and forums in different countries. Mr. Abdurahmanov has successfully launched an Industrial Business Center named TechnoPlaza, a business center and incubator for local SMEs. Mr. Abdurahmanov is the Chairman of the Board of Central Eurasian Leadership Alliance (CELA). Mr. Abdurahmanov holds a BA (2001) and a MA (2004) in International Economic Relations from the University of World Economy and Diplomacy in Tashkent and a MA in International Business from the School of Management at St. Andrews, UK (2006).



MR. MITCHELL BARAK

FOUNDER, KEEVOON GLOBAL RESEARCH

Mr. Mitchell Barak is a pollster, political analyst and entrepreneur. Called an "Israeli-American public opinion expert" by the Wall Street Journal, and "one of Israel's savviest pollsters" by The Washington Times, his opinions and surveys are regularly quoted in leading publications like the Wall Street Journal, New York Times, Bloomberg, Politico, Huffington Post, and many others. A polling tech entrepreneur, he co-founded MOBOPINIONS, a technology start-up that has developed an innovative platform for polling, profiling and targeting mobile phone users. In the past three years he has fielded more than 4 million survey research questions in 160 different countries. He also founded KEEVOON Global Research, a survey research and political communications firm based in Israel and has conducted survey research projects, both qualitative and quantitative, in a variety of countries and languages. Mr. Barak held a number of appointed positions within the Israeli government including as international media adviser for Israeli President Shimon Peres, speechwriter for Prime Minister Ariel Sharon and as an adviser to Finance Ministers Yaakov Neeman and Dan Meridor. Additionally, he worked as an aide to Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu in the Foreign Ministry and Prime Minister's Office during the tenure of Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir. A New York native, Mr. Barak holds a B.A. degree in Political Science and Psychology from George Washington University in Washington, D.C. He lives with his wife and their six children in Jerusalem. His hobbies are running, biking, photography and music, but he enjoys fatherhood and husbandry most.



DR. VITALIY BAYLARBAYOV

DEPUTY VICE PRESIDENT ON INVESTMENTS AND MARKETING, SOCAR

Dr. Vitaliy Baylarbayov has been the Deputy Vice President on Investments and Marketing of SOCAR, State Oil Company of Azerbaijan, since 2007. He is also a Member of the Association of International Petroleum Negotiators and a Member of the Board for Sarmatia, Euro-Asian Oil Transportation Corridor Project. He served as Chairman of the Board for Sarmatia in 2010 and 2015. Previously, he served as Transportation and Marketing Manager at Agip KCO (2003-2007) and as Deputy Director of the Agency of Foreign Investments at SOCAR (1995-2003). Dr. Baylarbayov has his Ph.D. in Economics.



MR. ERIC BROWN

SENIOR FELLOW, HUDSON INSTITUTE

Mr. Eric Brown is a senior fellow at Hudson Institute, where, since 2004, he has conducted research on Middle East and Asian affairs, on security and development issues, alternative geopolitical futures and U.S. strategy. He is the editor, with Dr. Hillel Fradkin and Ambassador Husain Haqqani, of Current Trends in Islamist Ideology, (www. CurrentTrends.org), and has written for many other publications, including The American Interest, The China Heritage Quarterly, The Wall Street Journal-Asia, and the Tony Blair Faith Foundation. In recent years, he completed several lengthy net assessments. The first looked at the geopolitical implications of China's expanding involvement in Central and West Asia, the second looked at what changes in Kurdish Society may mean for the next order in the Middle East, and the third was on the future of religious conflict. Since 2006, a core focus of Brown's research and consulting has been on the relations between governance and security, and designing strategies for securing populations in contested areas, from the Himalayas to Kurdistan and northern Africa. He's now at work on two projects. One looks at the break-down of order and spreading conflicts in the greater Middle East and how the U.S. can best bolster its allies and partners to cope with this. The second study, newly begun, looks at alternative schemes for connecting Eurasia and practical ways to ensure that growing cross-continental connectivity enhances open, rules-based societies rather than undermine them. Mr. Brown studied history and philosophy at Marlboro College, the great books of India, China and Japan at St. John's College, as well as throughout Asia. As a student, he also conducted fieldwork on Islam and ethnic minorities in China.



DR. STEPHEN CAMBONE

MEMBER OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS, RUMSFELD FOUNDATION

Dr. Stephen Cambone is a member of the Board of Directors of the Rumsfeld Foundation. He is also an independent consultant. Drawing on his extensive experience in government and business, he advises public and private sector leaders and managers in strategic plans and planning, operations, resource allocation and the use of technology to transform operations and business practices to increase capability and effectiveness, improve efficiency and achieve mission or financial objectives. He is the founder of Adirondack Advisors, LLC, and is an advisor to start up technology companies, public and private companies that service the national security market and to non-profit organizations. Dr. Cambone sits on the Proxy Board of MDA IS LLC and chairs its Government Security Committee and sits on the Special Security Board of Elbit Systems of America. He has served as the Thomas W. Smith Senior Fellow at the Ryan Center, Villanova University and is currently an adjunct faculty member at Johns Hopkins University. From 2007-2012, he served in senior corporate positions for QinetiQ North America (QNA). Prior to joining QNA, Dr. Cambone served from 2001-2006 in the Department of Defense. He was twice nominated by President Bush and confirmed for senior positions in the DoD, including as the first Undersecretary of Defense for Intelligence, responsible for the oversight of DoD's intelligence policy, activities and budgets and its relationship with the Director of National Intelligence and the broader Intelligence Community. Dr. Cambone was awarded the DoD Distinguished Public Service Medal by the Secretary of Defense, and the National Intelligence Distinguished Service Medal by the Director of National Intelligence. He was a Senior Fellow at the Center for Strategic and International Studies and Director of Research at the Institute for National Security Studies at the National Defense University. He is a member of the Advisory Board of the Intelligence and National Security Alliance (INSA) and the Advisory Board of the Volgenau School of IT and Engineering at George Mason University. Dr. Cambone received his Ph.D. and Master's degrees in Political Science from Claremont Graduate School and his Bachelor's degree in Political Science from The Catholic University of America.



DR. SVANTE E. CORNELL

DIRECTOR, CENTRAL ASIA-CAUCASUS INSTITUTE AND SILK ROAD STUDIES PROGRAM

Dr. Svante E. Cornell is the Director of the Central Asia-Caucasus Institute and Silk Road Studies Program, a co-founder of the Institute for Security and Development Policy in Stockholm and an Associate Research Professor at Johns Hopkins University-SAIS. His main areas of expertise include security issues, state-building and transnational crime in Southwest and Central Asia, with a specific focus on the Caucasus and Turkey. He is the Editor of the Central Asia-Caucasus Analyst, the Joint Center's bi-weekly publication, and of the Joint Center's "Silk Road Papers" series. Dr. Cornell is the author of several books, including Small Nations and Great Powers: the Ethnopolitical Conflict in the Caucasus (2001), the first comprehensive study of the post-Soviet Caucasus, and Azerbaijan since Independence (2011). His dozens of articles have appeared in numerous academic and policy journals. Dr. Cornell received his undergraduate education at the Middle East Technical University in Ankara, Turkey, and he holds a Ph.D. in Peace and Conflict Studies from Uppsala University. He also holds an honorary doctoral degree from the National Academy of Sciences of Azerbaijan. He is a member of the Swedish Royal Academy of Military Science and a Research Fellow with the Wilfried Martens Center for European Studies in Brussels.



AMBASSADOR ALBERTO M. FERNANDEZ

VICE PRESIDENT, MIDDLE EAST MEDIA RESEARCH INSTITUTE

Ambassador Alberto M. Fernandez is Vice President of the Middle East Media Research Institute (MEMRI) and a member of the board at the Center for Cyber and Homeland Security (CCHS) at George Washington University. He was a Foreign Service Officer from 1983 to 2015 and served as the State Department's Coordinator for the Center for Strategic Counterterrorism Communications from 2012 to 2015. He also served as Chief of Mission at the U.S. Embassies in Sudan and Equatorial Guinea. He held senior public diplomacy positions at the U.S. Embassies in Afghanistan, Jordan, Syria, Guatemala, Kuwait, and in the Department's Near East Affairs (NEA) Bureau. Ambassador Fernandez was a recipient of a 2008 Presidential Meritorious Service Award, the 2006 Edward R. Murrow Award for Excellence in Public Diplomacy, a 2003 Superior Honor Award for his work in Afghanistan, among other awards. A graduate of the University of Arizona (B.A. and M.A.) and the Defense Language Institute, he served in the U.S. Army and came to the United States as a refugee from Cuba in 1959. He has published in Soundings: An Interdisciplinary Journal, the AFPC World Almanac of Islamism, Journal of International Security Affairs, WINEP Policy Brief, the Foreign Service Journal, MEMRI, Brookings, Georgetown Cornerstone, ReVista: the Harvard Review of Latin America, Middle East Quarterly, the Journal of the Assyrian Academic Society (JAAS), and lectured and debated on U.S. foreign policy in numerous international and academic venues.



MR. FARRUKH IRNAZAROV

CO-FOUNDER AND COUNTRY DIRECTOR, CENTRAL ASIAN DEVELOPMENT INSTITUTE

Mr. Farrukh Irnazarov is a Co-founder and Country Director at the Central Asian Development Institute, of Tashkent, Uzbekistan and a Ph.D. Candidate in International Studies at the University of Groningen, Netherlands. He is in charge of several research projects on economic development, labour migration, regional trade and transport issues in Central Asia. From 2008 to 2011, he worked as a Researcher at the University of Applied Sciences in Goettingen, Germany. In 2007 and 2008, Mr. Irnazarov was an Associate Faculty Lecturer in International Trade at the School of Business at the National College of Ireland in Dublin. From 2000 to 2003, Mr. Irnazarov held different positions at the Ministry of Foreign Economic Relations of Uzbekistan. Mr. Irnazarov holds a B.A. in International Economic Relations from the National University of Uzbekistan, Tashkent (2002), a Master of Social Science in International and European Relations from Linköping University, Sweden (2005) and a Master of Science in Business Administration and Economics from Stockholm University, Sweden (2006).



THE HONORABLE IAN C. KELLY

U.S. AMBASSADOR TO GEORGIA

The Honorable lan C. Kelly, a career member of the Foreign Service, class of Minister-Counselor, was sworn in as the Ambassador to Georgia on September 11, 2015. Ambassador Kelly just completed a tour as the Department of State's Diplomat in Residence at the University of Illinois at Chicago, a position he held since 2013. Prior to that, Mr. Kelly served as U.S. Representative, with the rank of Ambassador, to the Organization for Security and Co-operation in Europe in Vienna, Austria from 2010 to 2013. From December 2012 to September 2013, he also served concurrently as the U.S. Co-Chair of the OSCE Minsk Group on an interim basis. From May 2009 until his appointment as Ambassador, he was the Spokesperson for the U.S. Department of State. Before he was named Spokesperson, Ian Kelly was the Director of the Office of Russian Affairs in Washington, D.C. Prior to his return to Washington, he served as Public Affairs Advisor at the U.S. Mission to NATO (2004-2007), Press Attaché at Embassy Rome (2000-2004) and Press Attaché at the American Embassy in Ankara (1997-2000). As Director of Democratic Initiatives to the Newly Independent States (NIS) at the Department of State from 1994 to 1996, Kelly coordinated the activities of nearly a dozen federal agencies involved in democracy building in the former Soviet Union, and oversaw an annual budget of around \$80 million. Prior to assuming that assignment, Kelly was a regional Public Affairs Officer for the NIS, a job that took him to all twelve former Soviet republics. Other assignments include Information Center Director in Belgrade, Yugoslavia (1990-92) and Assistant Cultural Affairs Officer in Leningrad and Moscow, U.S.S.R. (1987-90). Prior to joining the Foreign Service, Ambassador Kelly taught Russian at Columbia University in New York City, and received his doctorate at Columbia in Slavic Languages and Literatures in 1986. He also holds a B.A. from St. Olaf College in Northfield, Minnesota, and a M.A. from Northwestern University in Evanston, Illinois. Kelly speaks Russian and has studied Italian, Serbo-Croatian and Turkish at the National Foreign Affairs Training Center of the Department of State.



AMBASSADOR ZALMAY KHALILZAD

PRESIDENT, GRYPHON PARTNERS

Ambassador Zalmay Khalilzad is President of Gryphon Partners, a global advisory firm based in Washington, D.C. and author of The Envoy: From Kabul to the White House, My Journey Through a Turbulent World. He has been involved with U.S. policy makers at the White House, State Department and Pentagon since the mid-1980s. In 2001, President George W. Bush asked Amb. Khalilzad to head the Bush-Cheney transition team for the DoD and Amb. Khalilzad briefly served as Counselor to Secretary of Defense Donald Rumsfeld. Later he was appointed as U.S. Ambassador to Afghanistan (2003-2005), U.S. Ambassador to Iraq (2005-2007) and U.S. Permanent Representative to the UN (2007-2009). Prior to entering government service, Amb. Khalilzad worked as an Assistant Professor of Political Science at Columbia University's School of International and Public Affairs from 1979 to 1989. During that time, he worked closely with Zbigniew Brzezinski, National Security Adviser to President Jimmy Carter. In 1984, Amb. Khalilzad accepted a one-year Council on Foreign Relations fellowship to join the State Department, where he was an advisor to the Near East and South Asia Bureau. From 1985 to 1989, Amb. Khalilzad served in President Ronald Reagan's Administration as a senior State Department official advising on the Soviet war in Afghanistan and the Iran-Iraq War. Between 1993 and 2000, Amb. Khalilzad was the Director of the Strategy, Doctrine, and Force Structure at the RAND Corporation. There, he helped found RAND's Center for Middle East Public Policy as well as "Strategic Appraisal," a periodic RAND publication. Amb. Khalilzad sits on the boards of the National Endowment for Democracy, America Abroad Media, the Atlantic Council, the RAND Corporation's Middle East Studies Center, the American University of Iraq in Suleymania, and the American University of Afghanistan. He is a counselor at the Center for Strategic and International Studies. Additionally, he is the founder of the Zalmay Khalilzad Chair on Afghanistan for the Atlantic Council's "Afghanistan Rising: Sustaining Success in Afghanistan" Initiative. He earned his B.A. and M.A. degrees from the American University of Beirut, as well as a Ph.D. from the University of Chicago.



Dr. Johannes F. Linn

SENIOR FELLOW, THE BROOKINGS INSTITUTION

Dr. Johannes F. Linn is Resident Senior Scholar at the Emerging Markets Forum in Washington, D.C., Non-resident Senior Fellow at the Brookings Institution and Senior Advisor at the Results for Development Institute (R4D). During 2011 and 2014 he was the External Chair of the 9th and 10th IFAD Replenishment consultations. From 2005-2010, Mr. Linn served as Director of the Wolfensohn Center for Development at Brookings. Prior to joining Brookings in 2003, he worked for three decades at the World Bank in various capacities. In 1991, Mr. Linn was the Bank's Vice President for Financial Policy and Resource Mobilization. From 1996 to 2003, Mr. Linn was the Bank's Vice President for Europe and Central Asia. Building on his last assignment at the World Bank, Mr. Linn engaged in intensive research and advisory work on Central Asia. He served as the project director and principal author of the UNDP's Central Asia Human Development Report (2005). During 2007-2010, Mr. Linn was Special Advisor to the Central Asia Regional Economic Cooperation Forum (CAREC). He published a book jointly edited with Werner Hermann on Central Asia and the Caucasus: At the Crossroads of Eurasia in the 21st Century (Sage, 2011). He was project director and co-editor for the book Kazakhstan 2050: Toward a Modern Society for All (Oxford University Press, 2014). Mr. Linn has published extensively on development and global governance issues. His current research interests and recent publications are in the areas of aid effectiveness (with a special focus on scaling up successful development interventions), on global governance reform, and on regional cooperation (with a special focus on Central Asia). Mr. Linn holds a Bachelor degree from Oxford University (1968) and a doctorate in Economics from Cornell University (1973).



Dr. Frank I. Luntz

FOUNDER AND PRESIDENT, LUNTZ GLOBAL

Dr. Frank I. Luntz is one of the most honored communication professionals in America today. Frank was named one of the four "Top Research Minds" by Business Week and "the hottest pollster" by The Boston Globe. The "Instant Response" focus group technique pioneered by Frank has been profiled on 60 Minutes, Good Morning America (on Election Day), and on PBS's award-winning Frontline. He has been a guest on virtually every talk show in America. Frank has worked for 50 Fortune 500 companies and CEOs, but he's best known for political commentary. More media outlets have turned to Dr. Luntz to understand the hopes and fears of Americans than to any other political pollster. Since 2007, Frank has been the "Focus Group Czar" for Fox News, conducting over 100 sessions in more than 20 states. For the past four years, Frank has served as a news analyst for CBS News, focusing on corporate crisis communications as well as politics. His reoccurring segments on MSNBC/CNBC, "100 Days, 1000 Voices" won the coveted Emmy Award in 2001. From 1989 until 1996, Dr. Luntz was an adjunct professor at the University of Pennsylvania and has also taught courses at Harvard University and George Washington University. Frank graduated from the University of Pennsylvania with an honors B.A. in History and Political Science, and was awarded a Thouron Fellowship. He received his Ph.D. in Politics at the age of 25 from Oxford University.



Dr. James MacDougall

Professor of National Security Strategy, National War College

Dr. James MacDougall is Professor of National Security Strategy at the National War College. From 2013-2014, he served as Chairman of the Department of National Security and Strategy at the U.S. Army War College. Previously, he was the Deputy Director of the George C. Marshall European Center for Security Studies (2009-2013), a German-American institution founded to create a more stable security environment in Europe and Eurasia. He was awarded the Department of Defense's highest civilian award, the Distinguished Civilian Service Medal, by the Secretary of Defense for policy leadership and diplomatic achievement. Dr. MacDougall holds a Ph.D. in International Relations from Georgetown University.

DR. S. FREDERICK STARR

FOUNDING CHAIRMAN, CENTRAL ASIA-CAUCASUS INSTITUTE AND SILK ROAD STUDIES PROGRAM

Dr. S. Frederick Starr is the founding Chairman of the Central Asia-Caucasus Institute and Silk Road Studies Program, and a Research Professor at Johns Hopkins University-SAIS. His research on the countries of Greater Central Asia, their history, development, internal dynamics, as well as on U.S. policy towards the region, has resulted in 23 books and more than 200 published articles. He has also written extensively on architecture, music, and Russian politics and culture. One of his recent books, The Ferghana Valley: The Heart of Central Asia, involved the collaboration of some dozen scholars in four countries. During the past decade, Dr. Starr has returned repeatedly to addressing the challenges of reopening continental-wide transport passing through Central Asia and Afghanistan, which he sees as a key to success in Afghanistan. This issue was the subject of a series of articles he published between 2000-2008, and of his book, The New Silk Roads (2008). For Starr's articles that have had direct policy implications, refer to "Beyond the Fog of Nation Building: An Economic Strategy for Afghanistan" and "Finish the Job: An Economic Strategy for Afghanistan." In October 2013, his major publication, Lost Enlightenment: Central Asia's Golden Age from the Arab Invasion to Tamerlane, was published and is currently being translated into several languages worldwide.



Dr. Mamuka Tsereteli

RESEARCH DIRECTOR, CENTRAL ASIA-CAUCASUS INSTITUTE AND SILK ROAD STUDIES PROGRAM

Dr. Mamuka Tsereteli is the Research Director at the Central Asia-Caucasus Institute and Silk Road Studies Program. He previously served as the Director of the Center for Black Sea-Caspian Studies at the School of International Service at American University. He also served as an Assistant Professor at the School of International Service from 2007-2011. Dr. Tsereteli teaches classes on energy markets and energy security at Johns Hopkins University-SAIS and at American University. He speaks frequently at events related to international relations, economic development, energy security and country risk analysis in the Caucasus and Central Asia. DR. DANIEL TWINING

DIRECTOR AND SENIOR FELLOW FOR ASIA, GERMAN MARSHALL FUND

Dr. Daniel Twining is Director and Senior Fellow for Asia at the German Marshall Fund of the United States, where he leads a 15-member team working on the rise of Asia and its implications for the West through a program of convening and research spanning East, Southeast, and South Asia. Initiatives of GMF's Asia program include the Stockholm China Forum, India Trilateral Forum, Trilateral Forum Tokyo, Japan Trilateral Forum, Southeast Asia Trilateral Forum rum, Young Strategists Forum, Transatlantic Pakistan Workshops, and occasional study tours to Asia, as well as major research initiatives on China, Japan, India, Southeast Asia, the Trans-Pacific Partnership, and the impact of rising powers on the liberal order. Dr. Twining has taught South Asian Security Studies at Georgetown University and for three years was an instructor to U.S. Army officers up to the rank of three-star general preparing for deployment to theaters in South and East Asia. He writes regular columns for Foreign Policy and Nikkei as well as occasional pieces for the Financial Times and Wall Street Journal; he is on the editorial board of the Asan Forum and writes lengthier articles for this and other journals as well as occasional book chapters, on topics including India, Asian security and U.S. foreign policy. The Honorable S. Enders Wimbush is a Principal at StrateVarious LLC, and Distinguished Senior Fellow of The Jamestown Foundation.
